

# SSIS 2014, Part 09 of 11: Configuring and Deploying Packages

**Prerequisites:** This course assumes that you have a basic familiarity with the concept of relational databases and a basic understanding of what SQL Server is and the high-level tools in it, as well as how to create and manage objects using Management Studio. You should also have a basic understanding of how SQL Server implements security, including its authentication and authorization schemes, and how to assign permissions on securable objects to principals. You should know the fundamentals of Transact-SQL to write queries to retrieve data and join data from multiple tables, and how to execute scripts using the query editor in Management Studio. You must also know how to connect to an instance of SQL Server 2012 or 2014 using the various connection dialog boxes in Management Studio and development tools. It will be very helpful, but not absolutely necessary, to have experience with .NET development using Visual Studio 2013 or later for the portions of the course that deal with SQL Server Data Tools (which is a lot of it). At the very least, we assume that you are well familiar with the Visual Studio user interface. This course assumes no prior knowledge of SQL Server Integration Services beyond what is covered in the previous SSIS courses.

**Course description:** More often the package or project you are working on will need to be robust enough to run repeatedly. In that case, you'll need to deploy the package to a server and sometimes multiple servers, and Integration Services has a number of features that make this process easier, which you'll learn about in this course. The typical lifecycle of an Integration Services package has several phases. Each phase of the lifecycle may require that you use a different set of resources for the package. Items such as file paths and connection strings will vary from phase to phase. A feature called configurations allow you to create packages that are not bound to any particular location or environment, and you'll see how to use configurations in this course. Once your package is ready to be flexible enough to execute on various servers, you'll need to deploy it to one or more servers. You'll need to progress through several steps to develop packages and deploy them from one environment to another, and you'll learn how to do that in this course.
